GUIDANCE ON COPYRIGHT: AUTHOR'S RIGHTS

In assigning copyright to Oxfam GB, you the rights you personally retain as Author are:

- 1. the right to be identified as the Author of an article whenever and wherever the Article is published;
- 2. patent rights, trademark rights, or rights to any process, product, or procedure described in the Article;
- 3. the right to share with colleagues print or electronic 'pre-prints', i.e. versions of the article created prior to peer review, of an unpublished Article, perhaps in the form and content as originally submitted for publication;
- 4. the right to post such a 'pre-print' on your own website, or on your institution's intranet, or within the Institutional Repository of your institution or company of employment, on the following condition and with the following acknowledgement with the open URL of your article:

This is a pre-print of an article submitted for consideration in *Development in Practice*, which is available online at: http://journalsonline.tandf.co.uk/

5. the right to post the 'post-print' of the Article following publication in *Development in Practice* as an electronic file on an Author's own website for personal or professional use, or on an Author's internal university, college, or corporate network or intranet, or within an Institutional or Subject Repository, but not for commercial sale or for any systematic external distribution by a third party (e.g. a listserv or database connected to a public access server) provided that you include the following acknowledgement with the open URL of your article:

- 6. the right to share with colleagues (but not on a commercial or systematic basis) copies of an article in its published form as supplied by Taylor & Francis Group Ltd.
- 7. the right to make printed copies of all or part of your Article for use by you for lecture or classroom purposes provided that such copies are not offered for sale or distributed in any systematic way, and provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit;
- 8. the right to facilitate the distribution of the Article if the Article has been produced within the scope of an Author's employment, so that the Author's employer may use all or part of the Article internally within the institution or company, provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit;
- 9. the right to include an article in a thesis or dissertation that is not to be published commercially, provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit;
- 10. the right to present an article at a meeting or conference and to distribute printed copies of the Article to the delegates attending the meeting provided that this is not for commercial purposes and provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit;
- 11. the right to use the Article in its published form in whole or in part without revision or modification in personal compilations in print or electronic form, or other publications of an Author's own articles, provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit;
- 12. the right to expand an article into book-length form for publication, provided that acknowledgement to prior publication in *Development in Practice* is made explicit.
